

Annual Fall Outing

he Society's Fall Outing will be a visit to our neighbors at the Rindge Historical Society on Sunday, October 20. Despite both our physical and historical proximity (both towns, for example, were once part of Rowley Canada), the society hasn't visited Rindge since 1995. Since then, the Rindge Historical Society has acquired the Freeborn Stearns House and turned it in to an excellent museum. On display in the museum are many items that once belonged to Revolutionary War veteran Eleazer Blake, including his powder horn, some continental currency notes, and his discharge paper signed by George Washington.

The walls are decorated with maps, samplers, portraits, and a copy of the town's charter. Like us they have dresses, uniforms, and textiles on display, but at the heart of their museum is a stunning assortment of housewares collected by Rindge resident Mary Lee Ware, who began soliciting Rindge residents for donations in the late 1800s. Of particular interest to JHS members are a document of indenture signed by George Jaffrey and the hand painted sleigh of our own William Dean.

The outing will leave from the Jaffrey Civic Center parking lot at 1:00 pm. We will visit the museum first (24 School St, Rindge), then the Rindge Meetinghouse, which still houses the First Congregational Church of Rindge, and finally, the Meetinghouse Cemetery, wherein the aforementioned Eleazer Blake and Rindge's first resident, Captain Abel Platts, are buried. Custom dictates that we take a meal together at the end of the outing, so the society has reserved some tables at La Piñata Mexican Grill on Hadley Road, Jaffrey for 4:00 PM.

Rufus Porter Murals Celebrate 200 Years

ol. Benjamin Prescott peers across the room at the Civic Center where his dark portrait hangs. His view is of Main Street, once known as the Third New Hampshire Turnpike. He holds a scroll, possibly the proposal Benjamin worked on, getting the turnpike to run through Jaffrey. He succeeded and the 1799 charter was approved. It benefitted the town greatly, opening Jaffrey to decades of commerce and growth. It benefitted Col. Prescott as well. In 1803 he and son Oliver built a large brick tavern with 16 rooms on the turnpike, not far West of the tollgate and across Turnpike Road from today's MilliporeSigma plant. The inn served travelers for many decades.

Two hundred years ago, during the third decade of the turnpike's operation, a wagon with paints, brushes, stencils and other paraphernalia needed by a mural painter rolled up to Prescott Tavern. It was Rufus Porter, the itinerant artist who travelled widely in New England. It is uncertain how long he stayed, but when Porter departed, there was a 7 by 15-foot mural of a harbor scene painted on a wall of the Taproom which came to be called the Painted Room. There is no certainty regarding whether all four walls were decorated or only one. But the scene on that wall exists to this day.

Prescott Tavern changed hands one time but the original name carried on. Prescott Inn was offered for sale in the 1930s with no takers. Contents were sold at auction in 1938. In 1945 A. Erland Goyette of Peterborough bought the harbor scene painting (for many years thought to be Boston, now to be Portland) cutting it out of the wall, and displayed it in his Americana Museum. The inn was razed in 1950 for its bricks and valuable wood paneling.

The Goyette Museum closed in 1960 when Erland died. His widow dispersed the numerous items in the collection over the ensuing years. The Marriott Corporation purchased the harbor mural in 1979. Christy Cunningham, an expert trained in Italy in the restoration of frescos, was engaged to bring the piece to

presentable condition. When the work was completed in 1982 it was displayed in a lobby of the new Long Wharf Boston Marriott Hotel where it was viewed for 25 years. The Marriott donated the work to the Boston Museum of Fine Arts in 2007.
