This past year featured two programs on Jaffrey's history. In February, we heard Bruce Hill's Conant Generations presentation, and in August Dave Kemp spoke on Jaffrey's firefighting history. Both programs were excellent, and showed off the best of our resident knowledge and research.

Our biggest exhibition to date, the Warfield Birds, took place in August and September. Hundreds of people from across the US and even overseas came to see the 40+ hand-carved birds, sculptures, pottery, and drawings by two of Jaffrey's talented artists, Bob and Virginia Warfield. Our merchandise sales were excellent, and the birds now feature prominently in our display areas. A huge thank-you goes to the Jaffrey Preservation Alliance, Bob Warfield, the Civic Center, and of course Jeanne Duval for making this exhibition possible.

Our display rooms have been completely transformed in the past year, thanks to Jeanne Duval, Cathy Devlin, Charlie Turcotte, and others. The rooms are much more inviting, less cluttered, and display many of our artifacts under better conditions and lighting than ever before.

As always, we welcomed the Jaffrey Grade School 4th graders to Jaffrey Center in June, and many people came to visit the Little Red Schoolhouse during the summer. The annual Reading of the Declaration of Independence on July 4th was a huge success, and the Hancock Women's Club visited in late summer. Thanks go to the volunteer tour guides, readers, and participants; and to the Village Improvement Society for being a partner in showing off Jaffrey Center's history.





JHS Announces New Logo

From the Archives

The Jaffrey Historical Society has a collection of over 300 old glass slide photos and negatives in our archives. Some have been printed on paper and some have been scanned into digital images. Many just exist as glass slides, either in the 4" x 3" size as pictured below, or in the 7" format as pictured in the negative at right.



Member Janet Grant recently donated some additional slides produced by her grandfather, George Stetson, to compliment a previously donated collection. She also graciously donated an antique glass slide projector. While this projector still works and would dimly display the image on a screen, its real value is as an exhibition piece of old machinery. With today's technology we are able to scan the glass plates and then reproduce them digitally as brighter images. We can also zoom in for fine detail.



A good future project would be to organize the collection, scan the best images, and prepare a presentation for the public. The best images would include old buildings and scenes of Jaffrey as well as people familiar by name from historical narratives. Anyone with interest and possible experience dealing with these glass slides, and/or familiarity with digital scanning would be welcome to lend a hand for this project.
